The term "diluted chlorine" means that the chlorine concentration is low. This means that when chlorine is diluted, it becomes a weaker form of chlorine. Pool water has diluted chlorine in it.

Splashes of pool water will not harm your grass. But, adding a large amount of diluted chlorine to your lawn may indeed kill your grass.

For example, if you decide to drain your pool, that amount of chlorinated water on your grass will cause irreversible damage. It is recommended to dilute the water even more than normal before draining.

What Effect Will Undiluted Chlorine Have On My Lawn?

The term "undiluted chlorine" means that the chlorine concentration is much higher, and there is only a little or no water present.

If you accidentally spill undiluted chlorine to your lawn while you are working on your pool, your grass will become damaged. The chlorine will not only dissolve minerals present in the soil but will also alter the pH level of the grass.

Chlorine can also damage the grass by causing it to become brittle and dry. The color of the grass present in your lawn will start to turn light green or yellow, and it will die within three to five days.

If somehow undiluted chlorine gets on your lawn, you should immediately start your water sprinkler system. Try to dilute the chlorine without overflowing your lawn with water.

Whether chlorine water will kill your grass will depend on the chlorine concentration levels and the length of contact time between the chlorine and the grass.
